From the Pastor

This month of November will be a month filled with holy conferencing.

The North Central Jurisdictional Conference will meet November 2-5 in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Jurisdictional Conference is where Bishops are elected and appointed to their positions of leadership within The United Methodist Church. I believe the North Central Jurisdiction will be electing three new bishops, whose appointments will begin on January 1, 2023.

Our Charge Conference for Faith Community UMC will be held on Sunday, November 6, at 3:00PM. Charge Conference is a meeting of the local congregation with the District Superintendent. Items that are voted upon at the yearly Charge Conference include setting the pastor's compensation for the coming year, electing church officers and committee members, and updating our membership list. This year's Charge Conference will be a regional one. Many congregations from this part of the Miami Valley District will meet at the same time here at

FCUM to conduct our business together. Our Administrative Board will meet an hour prior to the Charge Conference in order to discuss all the items that will be voted upon and finalize all of our reports.

Finally, there will be a special session of the West Ohio Annual Conference held on Saturday, November 19. This online Conference will include both a clergy session and a full session. The purpose of this special Annual Conference is to approve the withdrawal of those congregations that have voted to disaffiliate from the UMC and the clergy that have chosen to surrender their United Methodist credentials and their West Ohio membership. I don't know yet how many churches this includes. At a recent clergy gathering, Bishop Palmer indicated it looked to be somewhere in the range of 45 congregations. (There are roughly 900 United Methodist churches in West Ohio.)

As United Methodists, we trust that God works through these times of holy conferencing. Let us pray for the Holy Spirit to pervade all of these gatherings and discussions.

A VOICE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP NOVEMBER 2022

Ecosystem

This word has become part of the English vernacular in the last ten years or so. It relates to a complex network or interconnected system. For instance, "Silicon Valley's entrepreneurial ecosystem" or "The entire ecosystem of movie and video production will eventually go digital."

Originally the meaning of ecosystem came from the word ecology, which is the study of the interactions of organisms with each other and their physical environment. In college in the 1960s I was fascinated with ecology and wanted to become an ecologist. After the word ecology was coined in the 1950s, the concept of an ECOSYSTEM was explained by scientists. It is a COMMUNITY of organisms, both plants and animals, that interact with each other and their physical environment.

Our Earth has both terrestrial and marine ecosystems. Our land and oceans have vast numbers of ecosystems. Wherever there are plants and animals living in association with each other, they share in the same ecosystem. Whether it is a woodland, a grassland, a wetland, a mountain, a river or an ocean, they have their own ecosystems. Climate change and global warming are having a very negative effect on many of Earth's ecosystems.

When the temperature of the ocean increases because the atmosphere above the ocean has gotten warmer because of the increased amount of CO2 in the air, more ocean becomes more acidic. When ocean water becomes more acidic in areas where there are coral reefs, the acid kills the coral. Living coral reefs are nurseries for many species of fish. Without large populations of fish the marine food chain breaks down and the larger fish in the area don't have enough food to eat.

This is a good example of a marine ecosystem demonstrating how living things are affected by their physical environment. Human activities make more CO2 and negatively affect Earth's ecosystems.
