From the Pastor

A new month is upon us and this month begins as we are headed into Holy Week. Holy Week is considered to be the most sacred week observed by the Christian Church. It is a time when Christ's followers are invited to put themselves in the crowd following the events of the Passion of Jesus Christ. Unlike the Christmas season, Holy Week and Easter aren't as culturally appealing, so it's common for many Christians to treat Holy Week just as any other week. Palm Sunday and Easter worship celebrations are observed for the most part, but the journey that Jesus took after the palm parade that gave us the opportunity to celebrate the empty tomb is often overlooked. If Holy Week is supposed to be the most sacred week of the Christian year, then what are we willing to set aside and or take part in to express our devotion to our Lord and Savior?

I encourage you to take some time during Holy Week to read each of the gospel accounts visualizing all that took place. (Suggested Readings: Matthew 26-28, Mark 11-16,

Luke 19-24, and John 12:12-21). Read one gospel account a day and before reading, invite the Holy Spirit to open your heart and mind to the fullness of God's love that is Jesus Christ. Also, on Thursday, April 6th, I invite you to join us for our Maundy Thursday service at 7pm in the sanctuary. The namesake for the service comes from the Latin word Maundy which means "command", and it was during the Last Supper on Thursday of Holy Week that Jesus gave his disciples the commandent to "Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." (John 13:34, NIV). On Good Friday, reread the crucifixion story with a sense of deep gratitude for the sacrifice that Jesus made for all humanity taking on the sin of the world.

On April 9th Suzanne and I look forward to the Easter Celebration with you all including a light breakfast in the Fellowship Hall from 9:00am-10:00am, Easter egg hunt at 10:00am and worship at 10:30am. When we take the time to journey with Jesus all the way from the Mount of Olives in the palm parade to the empty tomb, we experience the joy of Easter celebration at the depth of our hearts.

Tree Seedlings

Sunday, April 23 is tree seedling distribution day. It is also the day after EARTH DAY. In this article I will share with you the names of the tree species and a brief description of each species and the number of each species that will be available, FREE. Remember, if you take a seedling or more, you have to plant it. Each seedling will come with planting instructions for best results. Enjoy watching your seedling grow into a BEAUTI-FUL TREE. PLANTING TREES IS THE BEST WAY INDIVIDUALS CAN FIGHT CLIMATE CHANGE.

Norway Spruce (10): A fast growing evergreen with short dark green needles and can reach 40-60 feet in height. This tree makes an excellent wind break and Christmas tree.

White Oak (3): A slow to medium growing oak that can reach 50-80 feet in height. This tree prefers slightly acidic to neutral, deep, moist and well-drained soils. While it does produce acorns it also has beautiful color and can live for centuries.

Tulip Tree (3): A large-sized, straight growing tree that can reach 100 feet in height. The leaves are the shape of a tulip or a red maple leaf. It produces a greenish white flower in mid-June. The tree is commonly found in established forests throughout Ohio.

White Dogwood (3): This is a slow-growing species that grows to a mature height of 25 feet. It has excellent white flowers in the spring and red berries in September and October, which birds love to eat. It likes well-drained acidic soils. Be sure to plant it in a protected area without much wind.

Redbud (3): A medium growing tree which is found native in established forests across Ohio. The tree grows 20-30 feet in height and is one of the first trees to flower in the spring with beautiful edible red to purple flowers. It has dark green leaves throughout the summer.

Wildflower seed packets (4): Each packet will have about ½ ounce of native wildflowers in it. Plant them by broadcast and cover them with about ¼ inch of rich soil. Keep them moist until they germinate and have roots and are well-established. They flower at different times during the growing season. Plant them after the last frost. Wildflowers attract pollinators like butterflies, moths, bumble bees. They are especially helpful if you plant them close to a vegetable garden that has flowers that produce fruit, like tomatoes, melons and green beans. ENJOY! ~~Rev. Pulling Weeds: Bitterness

Before we know it, it will be time to work in our flower beds and vegetable gardens. I don't know about you, but so far I haven't mastered the art of staying ahead of weeds. Consequently, when I saw a recent Day Spring devotion with this title, I was intrigued and read it. Now I am sharing some of the thoughts taken from an excerpt from *Playing in the Dirt: 90 Devotions for Crazy Plant Ladies*.

The author uses an analogy comparing bitterness to a weed. While I don't know anyone who enjoys weeds or weeding, the author suggests that weeds of bitterness are easier to get rid of than other types. They are often the result of jealousy, anger, resentment, or unresolved issues. They can be relentless and seem to pop up just when we think our weeding is finished, but there is a solution for destroying bitter weeds. By radiating gratitude, we can scorch weeds of bitterness.

How long has it been since you were truly grateful and intentionally expressed gratitude? If you are like most of us, it may have been quite a while. A life of gratitude takes conscious effort, and it's often more difficult than it seems it should be.

Continuing the analogy, the author suggests that when we intentionally cultivate a practice of grattitude, turning over "hardened soil' in our hearts over and over, we discover the fertile ground for the growing new thing–gratefulness, appreciation, contentment, and gladness. Weeds of bitterness have nowhere to grow in a grateful heart.

What's blocking your heart from finding gratitude? To overcome bitterness, we must first own it. We may not be responsible for what has caused the bitterness, but we are responsible for what we choose to do with it. We have to be truthful with ourselves and make a conscious decision to change. Once we identify what stands in the way of change,

we can begin the process. It starts with being still and reflecting on what hasn't been working.

With God's help, all things are possible. He has set us free by the completed work of the cross, but He is always looking for our participation. He wants us to experience the abundant life Christ paid for us. I challenge all of us to begin by working on releasing our bitterness. If you haven't tried keeping a gratitude journal, that may be a place to start. It can be as simple as listing three things each day that you are grateful for. Sometimes changing the focus to what's positive in the midst of difficult times makes all the difference.
