NAILS 1 Chronicles 22:3

He (David) provided a large amount of iron to make nails for the doors of the gateway (to the temple).

At the time of bulding the temple (about 1000 BCE) iron was hard to come by. But David was gathering the necessary materials so his son Soloman could build a temple to the Lord. Everything had to be the best-even the common iron nail. At that time, nails had to be made by hand. The Blacksmith would hammer them out and put a crude head on the nail so that it could be driven into the wood. Iron was scarce and basically used for military equipment (swords and chariots). The fact that they were using iron nails in large quantities for building a temple was very unusual and worthy of being included in the Bible.

The making of nails has not changed for thousands of years. When the Romans conquered parts of Britain, they brought the technology of making nails. Their blacksmith made tons of nails for their planned constructions projects. When the soldiers were called back home to defend the

empire, they were afraid the barbarians in Britain would use their cache of nails to make weapons. They planned to return to Britain so did not want to take the nails back to Rome. Their solution was to hide them by burying them in select locations. They never returned to Britain so the nails remained hidden until rediscovered in the 20th century.

Some people have speculated that the nails found in Britain were from the same batch that was used in Jesus' crucifixion. John 20:25 "Unless I (Thomas) see in his hands the imprint of the nails and put my finger into the place of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe."

This is probably not true that these nails were used in the crucifixion; however the same technology of making the nails was probably used throughout the Roman Empire and thus used in crucifixions. Iron nails in the USA in the 1600's were considered so important that people who were moving would burn their houses so they could salvage and reuse their nails. The Virginia Legislature was so concerned about this practice that they passed legislation to forbid it. Today the nail is so inexpensive that it costs more for a carpenter to pick up a dropped nail than it is to just grab another out of their nail pouch. Not all nails are the same. We have different nails for each project. There are over 20,000 different types of nails but they all have the same purpose. They are to hold things together. By themselves nails are relatively useless. They are made for a purpose. When unused, they just lie around and take up space. We can compare our Christian life to nails. Like nails we are all different and have different talents. If we don't use our talents, we are relatively useless and are just taking up space. However if we put our talents to use, we can hold things together.

This should be our goal-to use our talents, to hold our family, our church and our community together-just like the common nail.

Each year on the Sunday closer to Earth Day, April 22nd, we have been offered tree seedlings to plant in our yards or other places. This year, that Sunday is April 21st.
