From the Pastor

Greetings church! I have been back from my spiritual formation and renewal leave for a month now. My heart is filled with gratitude and I thank the church for granting me this opportunity to be renewed. After being away for several weeks in the mountains of North Carolina, Suzanne and I both were ready to be home and reconnected with our church family. While we were still in North Carolina, the postponed 2020 General Conference convened on April 23rd and concluded May 3rd.

During the General Conference there were a couple of major decisions made that I wanted to highlight. I would also like to add that a large majority approved these actions. All language that has restricted the full inclusion of homosexual persons in the mission and ministry of the United Methodist Church was removed. The number of bishops in the United States has been reduced to 32 from 39. This change will result in some annual conferences to share a bishop and in September our conference, West Ohio, will begin to share a bishop with East Ohio. Our new bishop will be named sometime in July. The overall budget for the General Conference was reduced by 40% from the 2016 budget which was largely impacted by the disaffilliations but also a general reduction in the apportionment base percentage from 3.29% to 2.6% for 2025-26 and 2.9% for 2027-28. The last major action I want to mention is regarding what is known as "Regionalism". This is con-

stitutional change related to or connectional structure across the globe. This change would designate regions where the United States would be one of the regions along with regions in Africa, Europe, and Asia. Each region would have more freedom to contextualize the governance and ministries of their region while maintaining our connection in the mission and essentials of the faith. Regionalization will need to be ratified by all annual conferences of the UMC when they meet this year. The West Ohio Annual Conference is May 29-June 1 and we will be voting on this legislation at that time. With all this information that highlights change; the one thing that will never change is our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ. Let us continue to be a church that works towards this mission in all the ways we can, both locally and globally.

Meet the Historian

When Faith Community celebrated the 50th anniversity of the merger of First Methodist and Trinity Methodist, there was a great deal of information about both previous churches placed in the Narthex. No doubt you read some, and perhaps glanced at other information on display. The history of both churches, as well as Faith Community, was well displayed.

If you wondered how all this got assembled for your benefit, meet the church historian, Marlene Gifford. She is certainly well qualified to be the church historian because she is a longtime member of the church and served as church secretary for 27 and $\frac{1}{2}$ years. In addition, she was one of the first women to serve as Trustee in the late 1970's and early 80's. She first served as secre-

tary and then became chairman of the board. She was well qualified for this position since she had previous experience in both real estate and insurance and served on the board again a few years later. One of the responsibilities of the historian is to maintain files on the history of the church, keep track of members who have passed away and of course, collect history "as it happens" for future historians. Marlene has held this position for about the last five years.

She is a long time member of the Double I Sunday School class and she and her husband raised their daughter, Dawn, along with their grandchildren in this church. Dawn sang in the choir for many years before Covid.

Stephen Ministry

Frequently Asked Questions

Although Faith Commnity UMC has been a Stephen Ministry church since the early 1990's, it's not unusual that we have questions about the program. In the next few months, we'll revisit the most frequently asked questions: About Stephen Ministers, Receiving a Stephen Minister, Working with a Stephen Minister and Other questions. This month we'll concentrate on Frequently Asked Questions about Stephen Ministers.

Who are Stephen Ministers? Stephen Ministers are members of a congregation who are specially trained to provide emotional and spiritual care to individuals facing a crisis or difficult situation. They demonstrate God's love by coming alongside care receivers who need a little extra support.

How are Stephen Ministers trained? After submitting an application, being interviewed and receiving a favorable recommendation, potential Stephen Ministers must complete 50 hours of initial training. Topics include the art of listening, Christian care and prayer. Confidentiality, assertiveness, boundries, depression, grief and loss, and divorce. Stephen Ministers then participate in monthly

continuing education to help them grow as Christians and care givers.

How are Stephen Ministers supervised? All Stephen Ministers participate in monthly supervision. This supervision provides support, encouragement and accountability for each other so they can provide the highest quality care. During supervision, Stephen Ministers may discuss issues their care receivers are facing but they never discuss care receivers by name or give other identifying information. Only the Stephen Leader who handles referrals knows who is receiving care.

Who are Stephen Leaders? Stephen Leaders are Stephen Ministers who have undergone extensive additional training and who oversee the Stephen Ministry program. They recruit, select, train, organize, and supervise Stephen Ministry. They also help identify people in need of care and match them with a trained Stephen Minister. Longtime Stephen Minister Judy Mahan has recently completed Stephen Minister training and will be commissioned in June. She will join current Stephen Leaders Lynn Engle, Mike Engle, and Becky Cultice.

Why do Stephen Ministers volunteer? Stephen Ministers are Christians who have discovered that they have gifts of caring, enouragement, listening, faith, mercy, and compassion. They feel called to serve others through this ministry and participate because they know that in Christ alone is their hope.

What kinds of problems are Stephen Ministers equipped to deal with? Stephen Ministers support care receivers who are dealing with all sorts of problems. They include but are not limited to: the loss of a loved one, divorce or separation, failed relationships, family stress, hospitalization, serious or chronic illness, aging and dying, recovery after an accident or disaster, birth, adoption, miscarriage, infertility, unemployment or job crisis, financial concerns, relocation.

Are any areas off-limits? Stephen Ministers are not equipped to work with minors, those who are at risk of hurting themselves or others, or those who need mental health treatment, therapy, or medication. When appropriate, Stephen Ministers may refer care receivers to health professionals or counselors. A Voice for Environmental Stewardship June 2024

The Gulf of Mexico

In June of 2018 our family went on vacation to Port St. Joe on the panhandle of Florida. When I went into the water for a swim I could not believe how warm the water was. It was like stepping into a warm bathtub with water of at least 80 degrees F. Close to Port St. Joe was the resort town of Mexico Beach. On October 10, 2018 hurricane Michael made landfall at Mexico Beach with wind speeds of at least 160 mph with nearly 11 inches of rain. It had grown into a category 5 hurricane. It created a storm surge of 14 feet above sea level, devastating Mexico Beach, destroying hundreds of homes and almost all of the businesses. Since then I have seen on the news that the Southern states especially have been hard hit with extreme rainfall, flooding and frequent powerful tornadoes that have destroyed whole communities and left much human suffering in their wake.

As we have learned, the excess of heat in our atmosphere is coming from the excess of CO2 which holds heat close to the ground. When this excess heat is absorbed by the oceans and the Gulf of Mexico, more evaporation happens which carries more water vapor into the air, combined with the excess heat, creates a more unstable atmosphere. This creates conditions for more hurricanes and stronger ones. Even Ohio has had a significant increase in the number of tornadoes in the first six months of 2024. As we have learned from the vast majority of climate scientists from around the world, the human activity of burning fossil fuels for energy dramatically increases the amount of CO2 in our atmosphere. We have to find a more sustainable source of energy. Solar energy from solar panels does not add CO2 to our atmosphere. Cedarville University and Antioch University have acres of solar panels in order to supply energy to their campuses. More homes in Ohio are getting solar panels in order to reduce the rising costs of electricity from their utilities. Getting solar panels for our homes makes good sense if we want to be good environmental stewards. Climate change must be a major concern for all of us if we want to protect our Mother Earth from burning fossil fuels. -Alan Barone
