From the Pastor

As I am writing this article for June, I am preparing to go to the 2025 West Ohio Conference. This will be the first Annual Conference led by our new bishop Hee-Soo Jung. At this conference we will be voting on 4 Amendments to the Constitutions of the United Methodist Church that were passed by the General Conference in 2024. All amendments must be ratified by 2/3 vote in the aggregate across all annual conferences. The results will be tallied and reported sometime in the fall. Two amendments are associated with changing language that addresses inclusiveness and racial justice. One is an update to clergy educational requirements that provide for contextual adjustments across the globe. And the most impactful on the UMC's organization is an amendment to create regions to decentralize the structure which is currently centered on the United States. If ratified, this amendment on "Regionalization" would create 9 equal regions with the United States being one of the regions. Each region will have the capability to adapt limited sections of the Book of Discipline to their context without affecting other regions. All regions will remain connected by our core beliefs and doctrinal statements of faith and our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

In addition to the General Conference amendment ratifications, the West Ohio Conference will be voting on the usual recommendations related to the annual budget, clergy benefits, and clergy compensation minimums, as well as three additional recom-

mendations. Of the three additional recommendations, the first is in support of establishing guidelines for energy efficiency for new construction, building remodels, and encouragement to upgrade current facilities to improve long-term sustainability. Second, a recommendation to create an LGBTQ+ task force to assist the conference any way they can to help support churches with being in ministry with and for the LGBTQ+ community. And third, a recommendation for seeking the formation of an Ohio site of the Immigration Law & Justice Netwok to assist anyone in need of support in Ohio. The work of the Annual Conference keeps us all accountable to each other and to the Book of Discipline to empower the local church to be viable mission stations that reach out to all people extending the love of Christ and seek justice for all.

May we continue to be a safe space for exploring faith and building community.

Stephen Ministry

Ann Ledbetter, one of those who was involved in and supported Stephen Ministry since it was introduced at Faith, died since our last issue of Faith Links was published. We are indebted to Ann's commitment and leadership over the years and want to acknowledge her dedication and encouragement. Even when she

was no longer able to serve as a Stephen Minister, her heart was always with it. If you'd asked Ann about Stephen Ministry and how it was introduced at Faith, this is probably what she would have shared with you: Stephen Ministry offers one-to-one, confi dential care to those in our congregation and community who are struggling with a special need. Each individual is paired with a trained Stephen Minister; women work with women and men with men. Stephen Ministers offer Christian support and care, not advice and counsel.

Stephen Ministry was founded in St. Louis by Kenneth Haugk, a Lutheran pastor and trained clinical psychologist, who called on nine of his laypeople to help as Christian caregivers. This ministry was named after Stephen, the first lay person the Apostles asked to care for the needs of the early congegation described in Acts 6. What began with nine in 1975 has grown to more than 600,000 men and women who have trained and served as Stephen Ministers. Currently, there are more than 13,000 Stephen Ministry congregations representing 190 Christian denominations in the U.S. and Canada and 30 other countries. More than one-and-a-half million people have had a Stephen Minister to walk with them providing Christian care during tough times.

Faith Community has been a Stephen Ministry congregation since the early 1990's. Four individuals learned about Stephen Ministry and saw the possibilities for our church. Bob and Dorothy Montgomery, Cliff McKee, and Ann paved the way by being the first to train to become Stephen trainers and Stephen leaders. Many others have served in subsequent years.

Nothing would please Ann more than to know that our commitment to Stephen Ministry continues. This Christ-centered ministry is not a casual ministry. It involves prayer, thought, consideration, study flexibility, and commitment. We challenge you to prayerfully consider joining our next training class. Being a Stephen Minister is not only helpful to others, it's one of the most fulfilling and joyful experience you'll ever have.

The Endangered Species Act

Climate change and global warming are massive changes that have effected changes in many of Earth's ecosystems. They have caused the rapid decline of hundreds of species with families of animals and plants on Earth. Another way to describe the loss is to say that these animals and plants are being threatened with extinction because of environmental changes in their habitats. Habitats are also lost because of the expansion of housing and businesses, including agriculture. As the Earth's human population continues to grow, now at 8.2 billion, more natural habitats will disappear. Our government, with great bipartisan support, has wisely passed the Endangered Species Act in 1973. It seeks to protect our endangered species. In the U.S. many notable animals have been saved from extinction including: the California condor, the bald eagle, the grizzly bear, the humpback whale, and many species of birds have been saved from extinction. In fact, some 46 species of endangered animals have recovered under the Endangered Species Act. Many countries that have unique animals within their borders also have conservation laws that are protecting their unique animals. Gorillas, amazing African elephants and various species of the rhinocerous are also endangered. Poachers kill rhinos for their horns which are sold and used in traditional Chinese medicine.

God has given us this amazing planet teeming with life of all kinds. IN FACT, ALL ANIMALS AND PLANTS WERE THRIVING ON EARTH LONG BEFORE HOMO SAPIENS CAME ON THE SCENE. The least that we can do is CHERISH and PROTECT THE CREATURES THAT SHARE OUR PLANET WITH US.


